

American Fly Honeysuckle

Lonicera canadensis

-The American Fly Honeysuckle is a small erect shrub that can reach heights of 5 feet. The bark is light brown and it peels into thin strips.

-American Fly Honeysuckle can handle full sun and partial shade and flowers from July through September. The flowers are a pale yellow to a creamy white, and are sometimes tinged with red or purple.

-The fruit of the American Fly Honeysuckle is a fruit, which is usually red to purplish, usually having two together on a stalk with 3 to 4 seeds per fruit.

-American Fly Honeysuckle is a wonderful shrub to plant due to its attractive flowers, leaves, and fruits. Furthermore, songbirds love to eat its berries.
