

High-bush Cranberry

Viburnum trilobum

-The High-bush Cranberry is one of the best shrubs that you can plant for our feathered friends, plus it's cute to boot. It will grow in areas with full to partial sun and reaches heights of 6-16 feet tall. The many arching stems form a dense, round-topped crown, which makes a great natural privacy screen between neighboring lots.

-High-bush Cranberry is frequently found throughout the state along streams, in open or lightly shaded swamps, and on other wet grounds, and is subject to canker if planted on dry grounds.

-The fruit is used as a substitute for cranberries in making jelly, but they lose their flavor later in fall. Plant some High-bush Cranberry along with Winterberry for the birds.

-It could very well be the prettiest flowering shrub native to Langlade County, but it should be protected from browsing deer.
